Jeff Lipinski gave prayer, and Pat Reel led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Jeff Lipinski opened the budget adoption meeting for 2022 Budget.

Jeff Lipinski read the figures from Ordinance 2021-05 for the 2022 Budget. Total unit total for the budget is \$980,118.00. With a levy of \$362,345.00, and a tax rate of 1.2547. Home ruled funds were also budgeted for \$415,140.00; this includes \$252,640.00 for the ARP Coronavirus funds. Total budget for 2022 is \$1,395,258.00.

Pat Reel made a motion to accept Ordinance 2021-05 and adopt the 2022 budget as read. Myrna Claar seconded, and the motion carried with Pat, Myrna, Don, and Greg voting for passage.

There were no comments from the council or guests.

Jeff Lipinski opened the meeting.

Minutes from last meeting were approved.

Plan Commission – Mike Kanable reported he had no new business.

Board of Zoning Appeals – No new business to report.

TIF Board – No new business to report. Don Parvin said he would like to have a meeting with the TIF Board before the end of the year.

Historical Society – Dave Kieser was present and introduced Mark Dollase, Vice President of Preservation Services for Indiana Landmarks. Dave stated we had a PIP Grant to get the Interurban Station on the national registry. In Indiana you are allowed a couple of tries to do this, before another professional to take it over. We were denied getting it on the national registry. Dave said Mr. Dollase needs to close that grant out, and he has a gentleman in Marshall County that can do what needs to be done for \$2,000.00 to get it on the national registry. The town would fund ½ of this and Indiana Landmarks would fund the other ½. Dave said this is important to get done is there is a Historic Preservation Fund through the Indiana Department of National Resources that would provide additional funding for the interurban station project.

Jeff Lipinski asked Mr. Dollase how long this would take to get on the national registry. Mr. Dollase said about 18-24 months. He said that is if we turn in a brand-new nomination, he does not know if the work that Dave had put into it would be able to be considered to shorten that time or not. If so, it would still be at least a year. Mr. Dollase gave the council a proposal from Kurt (the person that
